Opportunities to Support Our Work

Dear Donors, Friends, and Families of the SLC and the SCC&L,

The great writer E.B. White is as admired for his children's books (Charlotte's Web, Stuart Little) as he is for his essays (from "Here is New York" to "Once More to the Lake"), to name a few of each. One of his wry observations strikes me as perfect in this season of thanks-giving.

"I arise in the morning torn between a desire to improve the world and a desire to enjoy the world. This makes it hard to plan the day."

To improve the world and enjoy the world: that's the definition of philanthropy!

It took me a while to really understand this, but now it's exactly how I see how closely related the act of giving and the feeling of joy are to each other. Let's talk about joy. The joy of family. The joy of community. The joy of accomplishment. The joy of making some sort of difference in the world...philanthropy.

We just experienced the joy of philanthropy firsthand when Joe got the confirmation that we were receiving

How to Create a Win-Win Legacy

Here's a simple example.

Say you donate \$10,000 to the Subsidy Fund. And let's say the fund earns 10% (or \$1,000 on your specific gift) in the first year. Following our fund guidelines, that means that \$750 of those earnings can be distributed to support those in need of financial assistance, and \$250 will get reinvested back into the Subsidy Fund. So, after a year, your gift is actually worth \$10,250. And even without considering the benefits of compounding interest, in four years your original gift of \$10,000 becomes more like \$11,000! And all the while it generates \$750 or more for

subsidies every year for life and grows bigger itself every year.

It's a win-win situation in the best sense and a bona fide legacy builder. Imagine if 50 of our 1,800 donors and close friends were able to donate \$10,000 to, say, our Subsidy Fund? That would mean an additional \$37,500 in scholarship funds to residents in need after just one year! And that original collective \$500,000 contribution would amount to \$600,000 or more in four years.

These are just examples of how meaningful your support can be—today and for many, many

tomorrows. Please think about all the ways you might pull together a gift of significance. And look at the available naming opportunities (on pages 7-8) because they can apply to major gifts to any of the endowment funds. It would be our honor.

Are you able to consider—through appreciated stocks and IRA distributions, perhaps (lots of good tax advantages there)—a gift of \$100,000 over four years? You could put your name on, say, the Meditation Chapel for a generation. And the impact of your generosity on the lives of residents and the community at large would last forever.

the largest single gift in our history to see us through the first two phases of our capital campaign. Our gratitude was surpassed only by the joy and satisfaction coming from the donor.

So let's spread that joy to all of you reading this newsletter. As we ask you to help us build up our special endowment funds, we're creating legacy building for all! The idea is, a significant gift to any one of these cause-directed funds is a real investment in the future. And leaves you—and us—a real legacy.

Please give some thought to assembling an ambitious gift, look over the Naming Opportunities page, and talk with Joe and me about how you might find joy by expressing yourself philanthropically.





Some of her signature accomplishments include adding more diverse and affordable housing; providing more

educational opportunities such as full-day kindergarten; addressing the climate crisis locally; preserving open spaces, including Webster Woods; making Newton a more walkable city; creating programs for families struggling financially; improving emergency services; investing in paving roads and bike lanes; and supporting elder programs and services.

She is excited to announce the grand opening of the Cooper Center for Active Living on Friday, December 5, a cutting-edge center which will be used by the entire Newton community for activities such as pickleball,

basketball, art, culinary programs, lectures, and movies. Much like the philosophy of the Scandinavian Living Center's communitycentered living, the Cooper Center will enable everyone to enjoy an intergenerational experience in a modern space with a full-size gym, walking track, multi-purpose room, full kitchen, and a rooftop deck. The residents of the SLC can look forward to enjoying its many amenities.

Several years ago, in an interview with Erika Tarantal for Chronicle. Mayor Fuller remarked that the Scandinavian Living Center "is a special place that crosses the borders and boundaries of age" and that people from all over Newton come here all the time to enjoy its many offerings. She also mentioned to Joe Carella, Executive Director, that the design and philosophy of the new Cooper Center would integrate the idea of community-centered living with its emphasis on connecting people of all ages.

Mayor Fuller's term is up January 1, 2026. In addition to enjoying her four grandchildren, she expects she will stay involved in public service in some capacity. We hope so! And we agree with her vision of Newton as "one of the greatest places in the world" to live, raise a family, and retire.
